

Council Meeting – April 15, 2021

Mayor, David B. Eaton called the regular council meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. with the following council members present: Tom Hardesty, Troy Ethington, Pam Carter, Shane Suttor, Mike Zoeller, and Frank Page.

City Employees Present: Jennifer Herrell, Fred Rogers and Carla Wainscott.

City Attorney: Steven Gregory

Minutes - Regular Called Meeting of April 1, 2021

Councilmember Carter moved to approve the minutes of the regular called meeting of April 1, 2021 as read by the council members prior to the meeting. Seconded by Councilmember Page.

All voted “aye” and the motion carried.

Bid Approvals – Jennifer Herrell, City Engineer

Seventh Street Project Bid - Ms. Herrell recommends that City Council accept Louisville Paving Co., Inc., base bid of \$710,829.00 for the Seventh Street Project. She also recommends accepting the approval of Louisville Paving Co., Inc., for alternative bids for a total of \$172,210.00.

Councilmember Suttor moved to approve the bid. Seconded by Councilmember Ethington.

All voted “aye” and the motion carried.

2021-2022 Salt Bids – KACO reverse auction was \$93.75 a ton. The City of Shelbyville Council rejects KACO amount.

Councilmember Page moved to reject the bid from KACO. Seconded by Councilmember Ethington.

All voted “aye” and the motion to reject the bid carried.

Compass Minerals is \$89.30 a ton for 200 tons. The City of Shelbyville is looking at 200 tons. The bid would be less than \$30,000. Therefore, bid process is not applicable in this case.

Councilmember Hardesty moved to approve the bid from Compass Minerals. Seconded by Councilmember Carter.

All voted “aye” and the motion to accept the bid carried.

Resolution No. 2021-04-15/A Resolution of the City of Shelbyville Authorizing the Mayor to Make Application for and, Upon Approval, to Enter into an Agreement with the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security (KOHS), to Execute any Documents which are Deemed Necessary by KOHS to Facilitate and Administer the Project and to Act as the Authorized Correspondent for this Project, this Resolution also Establishes Procurement Policy for any KOHS Approved Project for the FY-2021 Application Cycle, Steven Gregory

Steven Gregory, City Attorney, read a resolution of the City of Shelbyville authorizing the Mayor to make application for and, upon approval, to enter into an agreement with the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security (KOHS), to execute any documents which are deemed necessary by KOHS to facilitate and administer the project and to act as the authorized correspondent for this project, this resolution also establishes procurement policy for any KOHS approved project for the FY-2021 application cycle.

The funds will be used for equipment and/or services purchased for the Shelbyville Fire Department.

Councilmember Carter moved to approve the resolution. Seconded by Councilmember Page.

All voted “aye” and the motion carried.

Resolution No. 2021-04-15(A)/A Resolution Authorizing the City of Shelbyville to Apply for a Community Development Block Grant that Will Help Cover Utility (Water, Sewer, Electric, Gas, Other Energy Sources for Heating and Cooling) Payments for Residents of Shelbyville Who Have Been Financially Impacted by Covid-19 (Such as Loss of Job) and Who are in Danger of Having Their Utilities Disconnected Due to the Inability to Make Payment, Steven Gregory

Steven Gregory, City Attorney, read in summary a resolution authorizing the City of Shelbyville to apply for a Community Development Block Grant that will help cover utility (water, sewer, electric, gas, other energy sources for heating and cooling) payments for residents of Shelbyville who have been financially impacted by Covid-19 (such as loss of job) and who are in danger of having their utilities disconnected due to the inability to make payment.

The resolution will partner with Multi-Purpose Community Action. KIPDA will administer the project. The non-profit will handle the application process.

Councilmember Ethington moved to approve the motion. Seconded by Councilmember Hardesty.

All voted “aye” and the motion carried.

Ordinance No. 2021-04-15/An Ordinance Enacting Text Amendments to Article VI of the Shelbyville Zoning Regulations, 2nd Reading, Steven Gregory

Steven Gregory, City Attorney, read in summary, an ordinance enacting text amendments to Article VI of the Shelbyville Zoning Regulations.

This is concerning zoning on Sixth Street, making sure these businesses are for retail services on the first and second floor between Sixth and Main. All businesses located there now are grandfathered in. Appendix A will demonstrate the location of businesses and establishments of zones.

Councilmember Zoeller moved to approve the motion. Seconded by Councilmember Carter.

City Administrator – Fred J. Rogers

Mr. Rogers reported on the City sponsoring an intern out of the University of Louisville Public Administration Program. It was a successful program. The intern filled out and applied for a grant for the City of Shelbyville in which we received that grant for the Kentucky State Heritage Council in the amount of \$24,000.00. This will be used for historic structures.

City Clerk’s Report, Carla Wainscott

Department Reports

Mayor, David B. Eaton, noted that Weissinger Hills Golf Course and Shelby Main Street reports are in councilmembers packets.

Jennifer Herrell, City Engineer, reported Clean-up Shelbyville was held April 5 – 9, 2021 and was successful. The Conference Center is on schedule with completion expected by the end of July. The Police Station Renovation Project completion date is estimated to be finished by the

end of May 2021. Mrs. Herrell is working on finalizing plans for the Sixth Street Project with advertisement of bids. Bid openings will take place on May 13, 2021.

Mayors Report

Mayor Eaton stated that the Dogwood Festival, Shelby Showcase and the Historic District Building dedication for Duanne Puckett will all take place on Saturday, April 24, 2021. The Municipal Road Aid Public Hearing will take place May 6, 2021, at 6:15 p.m.

Council Reports

Councilmember Zoeller gave a report on non-sidewalks between West Middle and Painted Stone schools. There was discussion on whether the City should help the School Board and North Country Subdivision obtain financial funds to help provide construction of sidewalks. If we agree to do this, they have asked that Jennifer Herrell head-up the project. The Mayor needs the Council permission to work with the school board to see if a solution is possible.
